

Hamilton neighbourhoods and property types

Hamilton, Ontario has a broad mix of property types, and that diversity shapes the way local pest problems emerge. A pest control Hamilton plan that works for a downtown apartment may not be the right fit for a detached home near the escarpment or a townhouse in a newer subdivision.
