This single upgrade triggered a massive shockwave in the trading community, permanently separating "investable skins" from "practical secrets."

Kinds of Keys in Counter-Strike

1. Requirement Case Keys

Bought directly from the in-game store for £ 2.50. These can open the vast bulk of basic weapon cases currently dropping in the game.

2. Operation Keys
