1. Examine and Replace Weatherstripping

3. Caulk Gaps Around Frames

Exterior spaces let water permeate into walls, triggering structural damage.

- **How to fix:** Scrape away old, cracked outside caulk. Use a bead of high-grade, paintable outside silicone-acrylic latex caulk along the frame joints, smoothing it out with a damp finger or caulking tool.

4. Change Door Hinges

Drooping doors typically have loose screws or a hinge that needs tension adjustment.

- **How to repair:** Tighten loose screws. If the holes are removed, eliminate the screw, place a small piece of wood toothpick covered in wood glue into the hole, and re-insert the screw for a tight grip.
