

Bayport does not announce itself with flash. That is part of the appeal. Tucked along the South Shore of Long Island, this small hamlet has the kind of quiet confidence that rewards travelers who like their destinations with a little texture. You do not come to Bayport for a skyline or a blockbuster attraction. You come because the streets feel lived in, the water is close enough to shape the air, and the pace invites you to slow down without feeling like you are missing anything.
