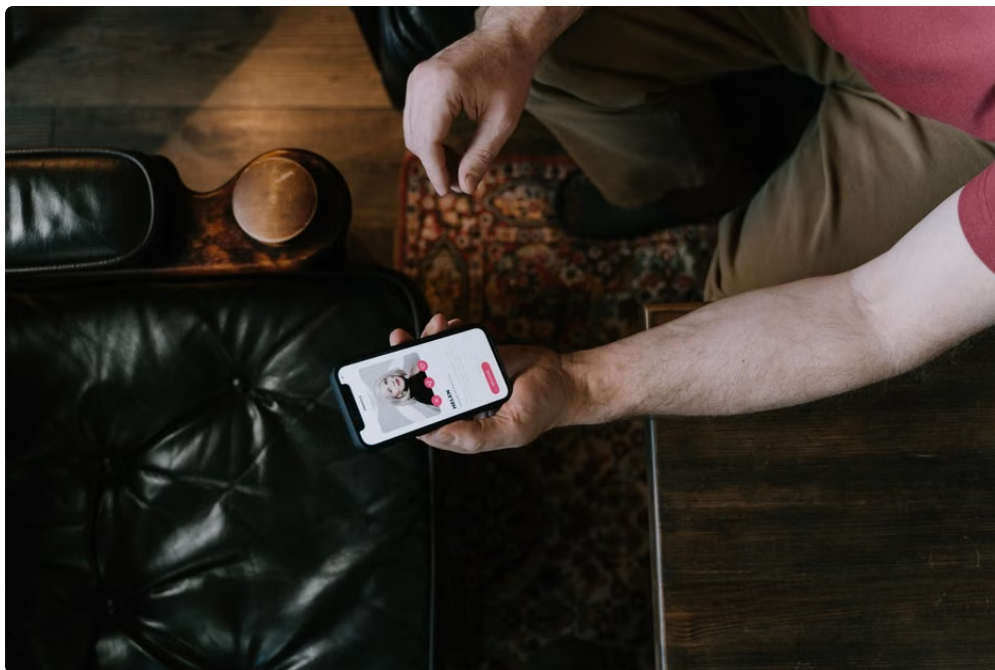
Engaging with an unlicensed or unauthorized casino exposes you to financial risk, lack of player protection, and possible legal consequences.
