Chances are set by bookmakers, comparable to standard sports wagering.

The Regulatory and Legal Landscape

The intersection of video games, minor gambling, and unregulated financial markets has drawn substantial attention from governments, regulative bodies, and Valve itself.

Valve's Crackdown

In 2016, Valve provided formal cease-and-desist letters to dozens of significant skin gambling sites, stating that these platforms were breaking the Steam Subscriber Agreement by utilizing OpenID and commercial APIs for business gambling purposes. Ever since, the environment has existed in a continuous cat-and-mouse game: sites frequently change their domain, embrace cryptocurrency alternatives, and adjust their integration approaches to stay operational.

Legal Considerations

- **Underage Gambling:** Because Steam accounts are easily available to minors, skin gambling has historically dealt with serious criticism for exposing underage users to gambling dependency.
- **Lack of Consumer Protection:** Unlike managed casinos accredited by main government bodies (e.g., the UK Gambling Commission or Malta Gaming Authority), many CS: GO sites run offshore with little to no legal recourse for users if a website all of a sudden closes down or declines to pay out.
