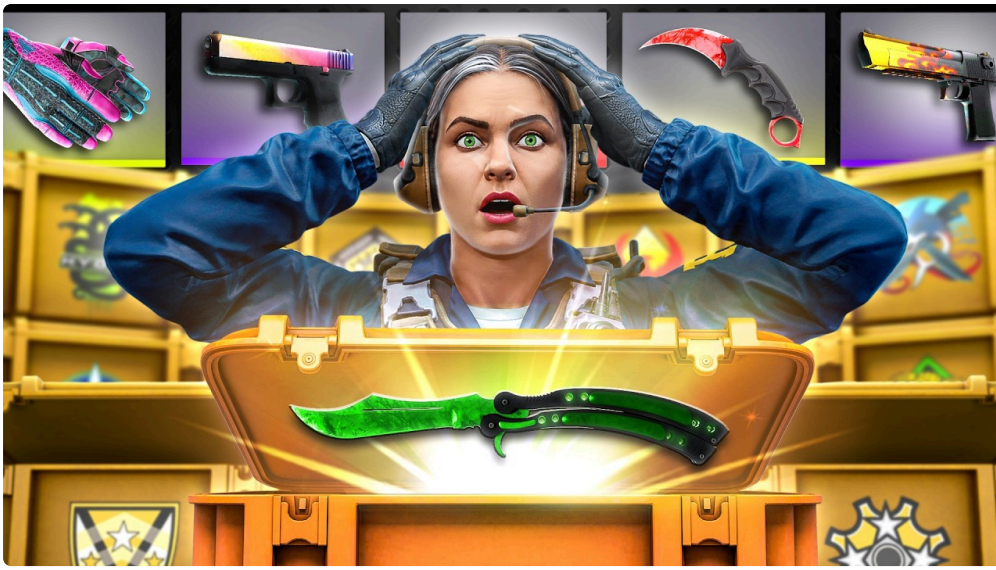

How Do They Work?

Security and Legal Considerations

Age Restrictions

Licensing and Regulation
