

Jessup, Maryland has always been a place defined by movement. Freight trains, workers, commuters, and day-trippers have all passed through or around it, each leaving a small mark on the town's character. It sits in that practical middle ground between Baltimore and Washington, close enough to both to feel their pull, but still distinct enough to keep its own identity.
