

Commack has a way of surprising people who think they know Long Island only through its beach towns and commuter corridors. It sits inland, practical and well connected, but the place has a layered identity that reveals itself slowly. A visitor might notice the steady traffic along Jericho Turnpike or the familiar stretch of Northern State Parkway, then look a little deeper and find old roots, active civic life, and neighborhoods that still carry the character of earlier generations.
