- **The Reverse Martingale (Paroli):** Players double their bets after a *win* instead of a loss, trying to ride a winning streak while keeping losses decreased to the base bet amount.
- **The Moonshot Strategy:** Placing small bets with the intent of claiming enormous multipliers (50x, 100x, or greater). This works similar to playing the lotto.
