Field-Tested (FEET)	0.15-- 0.38	Noticeable wear, scratches, and fading. The most typical condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Substantial wear, heavy scratching, and obvious paint cracking.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Exceptionally used, rusted, or faded. Sometimes valued for special "blackimov" results.
