- **Diversify Your Inventory:** Instead of putting all funds into one ultra-rare item, holding a range of mid-tier, high-demand items (like universally enjoyed tool or weapon skins) provides much better liquidity.
- **Be careful of Scams:** Never click random links, log into third-party sites with suspicious URLs, or accept blind trades from complete strangers.
