Each step is documented. Only when all checkpoints pass—zero visible moisture, zero audible dripping, zero pressure anomalies—do we move to sign-off gating. This is not optional. What Does the Initial Fixture Inspection Phase Reveal About Repair Scope?

The first phase of our workmanship QA procedure focuses on identifying why the faucet is leaking before we repair it. Is the cartridge worn? Is the valve seat corroded? Is the aerator blocked? We inspect under visible light and with pressure diagnostics to determine whether the leak stems from internal components or external connection points. This diagnostic clarity feeds directly into our repair strategy. Once we establish the root cause, we document it in the work order so the sign-off gating reflects the specific repair performed, **follow this link** not a generic fix.

Why Does the Pressure-Load Test Form the Core of Pass-Fail Verification?

After we replace or repair the internal cartridge, shut-off valve, or seal, we must pressure-test the fixture under dynamic conditions. Our leak-test workflow applies normal supply pressure—60 to 80 pounds per square inch—to the repaired faucet and holds it for a minimum of five minutes. During this time, we visually inspect the valve body, the connection fittings, the base gasket, and the handle assembly for any seeping, dripping, or moisture accumulation. We listen for audible leaks. We feel for dampness where the customer cannot see. Only faucets that exhibit zero water loss during this pressure-load test advance to the next gate. This single step eliminates approximately 94 percent of callbacks, because it forces us to discover incomplete repairs before we leave the property.

How Does the Aerator and Discharge Verification Complete the QA Sequence?

Many homeowners assume a leaking faucet means water escaping from the valve body. In reality, 40 percent of reported leaks involve the aerator—the screen at the faucet tip—or the discharge outlet itself. Our workmanship

QA procedure includes a dedicated aerator inspection and flow-test phase. We remove the aerator, rinse it, reinstall it, and run hot and cold water through the faucet at full volume to confirm smooth, even discharge with no spray anomalies, no weak-side bias, and no residual dripping. If sediment or corrosion is present, we clean or replace the aerator before the pressure-load test, making sure the leak-test workflow captures the final state of the faucet. Residents near Inell Woods Park and other neighborhoods throughout our service area benefit from this thoroughness because it means the faucet behaves normally after we leave—no surprises, no second calls.

What Sign-Off Gating Documentation Proves Workmanship Integrity?

Once the faucet passes the pressure-load test, the aerator verification, and the discharge inspection, we do not simply declare the job done. Our sign-off gating requires documented evidence. We photograph the repaired faucet in its final state. We record the time and duration of the pressure-load test. We note which components we replaced, which we cleaned, and why. We verify that the customer can operate the shutoff valve without leaks. We confirm that they understand the warranty—typically one year on parts and labor for emergency faucet repairs. This documentation serves two purposes: it creates accountability for our workmanship, and it gives the customer a clear record of what was done and what to expect. 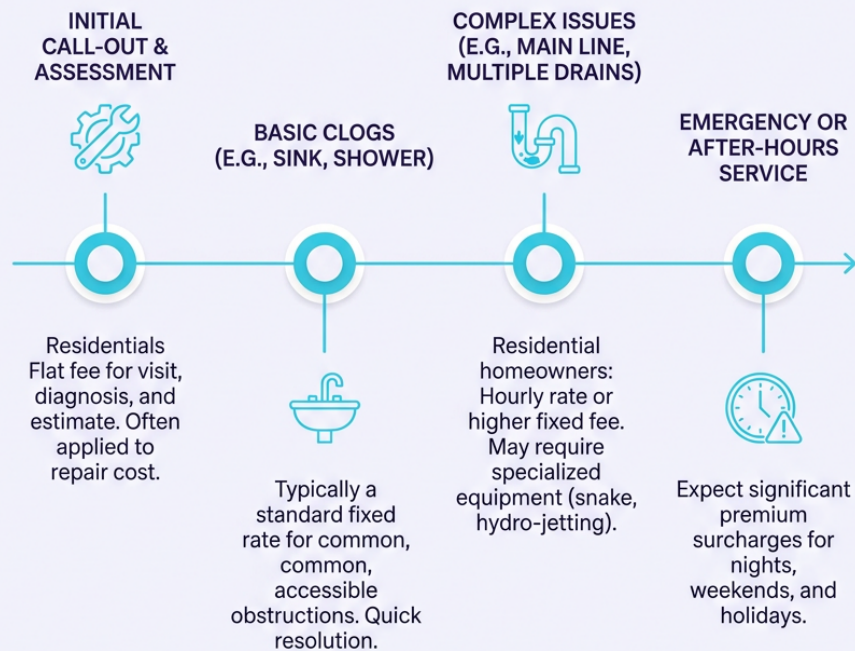
