- **StatTrak™:** Adds a physical counter to the weapon that tracks eliminates. The chance of getting a StatTrak™ product is around **10%** of the standard drop rate.
- **Drift Values:** Range from Factory New (0.00 - 0.07) to Battle-Scarred (0.45 - 1.00), significantly impacting the weapon's visual look and market price.

3. The Economics of the Steam Market

The economy surrounding CS: GO skins is entirely player-driven, regulated by supply and need, and assisted in by the Steam Community Market and third-party trading sites.
