After that week ends, gamers can trade them with buddies or offer them on the **Steam Community Market** for Steam Wallet funds.

This produces a vibrant marketplace dictated by supply and demand. Rare skins, stopped items, and those preferred by popular content creators can skyrocket in worth.

Secret Factors Influencing Skin Prices

- **Supply:** How many copies of the skin were acquired during its time in the official store. Low-supply items typically value in worth.
- **Need:** Is the skin aesthetically pleasing? Does it use tactical benefits (like camouflage)?
- **Youtuber/Streamer Hype:** If a popular *Rust* content creator utilizes a specific skin set, demand for those items often surges.
