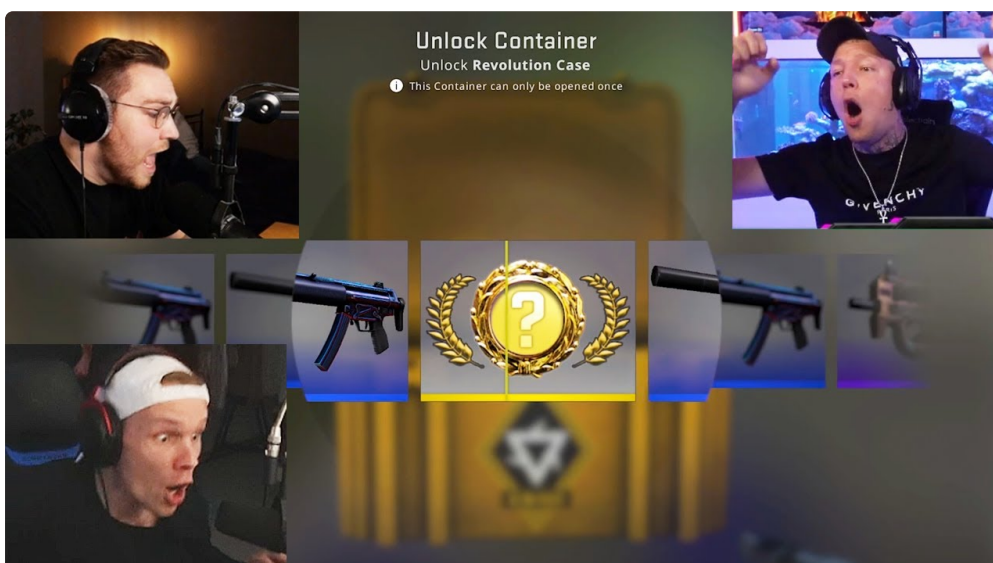
What Is a CS2 Case Battle?

Charges are a sign and might change based upon promotions or payment approach.

All of these platforms require you to link a Steam account and deposit skins or funds (frequently by means of crypto, credit card, or payment services such as PayPal). When the battle concludes, payouts are credited instantly, and you can withdraw skins to your Steam inventory or transform them to cash on the site's market.

How to Start a Case Battle in 5 Simple Steps

1. **Develop an Account**-- Register on your picked platform and verify your Steam profile.
2. **Deposit Funds**-- Transfer skins by means of the platform's deposit system or buy credit straight.
3. **Select a Battle Type**-- Choose in between a quick 1v1, a custom battle, or a multi-player lobby.
4. **Set the Stake**-- Decide the entry cost (in skins or monetary value) and confirm the case list.
5. **Launch the Battle**-- Click "Start" and enjoy the RNG choose the result.

Yes. Most platforms supply a "Custom Battle" mode where you can choose particular cases, change the number of rounds, and set the entry cost.
