Condition Name	Drift Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Beautiful condition with little to no noticeable scratches or wear.
Minimal Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Extremely minor acnes, typically only noticeable upon close assessment.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Obvious wear, scratches, and small paint cracking on high-friction locations.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Substantial wear, fading colors, and prominent scratches.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Heavily distressed, rusted, or scraped away, often providing the weapon a gritty, commercial appearance.

The CS2 Economy: Rarity Tiers

Skins are categorized into various rarity tiers, which determine their drop rates in-game or acquisition rates via weapon cases. Comprehending these tiers is necessary for anyone wanting to comprehend the market worth of their inventory.

- **Customer Grade (White):** Common, fundamental weapon finishes, typically discovered in weekly gameplay drops.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly less common than consumer grade, however still normally low-value.
- **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** The basic baseline for a lot of collection and case skins.
- **Restricted (Purple):** Often forms the middle tier of case drops; visually striking and reasonably priced.
- **Classified (Pink):** High-tier weapons that feature complicated artwork and command substantial market attention.
- **Covert (Red):** The highest basic weapon tier, including the most in-demand rifle and SMG surfaces in the video game.
- **Unique Item (Gold/Exotic):** The rarest tier, encompassing knives and agent gloves.

- **Weekly Care Packages:** By playing on main servers and leveling up when a week, players get a care package permitting them to pick a couple of free graffiti or weapon drops.
