Repairing a Sagging Door

2. **Shim the hinges:** If tightening up screws fails, position a little piece of cardboard, folded paper, or an industrial hinge shim behind the loose leaf of the hinge to modify the door's angle.

Removing Door Drafts (Weatherstripping Replacement)

If light or air seeps around the edges of an exterior door, the weatherstripping has likely flattened or torn.

1. Eliminate the old weatherstripping by pulling it out of its channel.
2. Clean the channel completely.
3. Step and cut new weatherstripping (foam tape, V-strip, or interlocking metal) to fit the top and sides of the door frame.
4. Protect the brand-new product according to the maker's directions.

Fixing a Stuck Window

Painted-shut windows or warped sashes are typical in older homes.

1. **Break the paint seal:** Run an utility knife thoroughly along the joint where the sash satisfies the frame, both within and outside.

Changing Window Glass

For single-pane windows with split glass:

1. **Safety initially:** Wear heavy gloves and protective eyewear. Tape the broken glass with an 'X' shape to minimize shattering.
2. **Eliminate old glass and glazing:** Pry out the damaged fragments. Use a sculpt or heat weapon to soften and get rid of the old putty (glazing compound) and metal glazing points.

3. **Prep the rabbit:** Apply a thin layer of fresh glazing compound to the wood rabbet (the recess where the glass sits).
4. **Set up the brand-new glass:** Press the brand-new glass pane firmly into location. Protect it with new glazing points pressed into the wood every 6 to 8 inches.
5. **Apply brand-new putty:** Roll a rope of glazing substance between your hands, press it into the joint, and smooth it at a 45-degree angle with a putty knife. Let it cure and paint it to match.
