- **Uncommon Drop Pool Cases:** No longer drop frequently after matches. As players continue to open them, the total supply dwindles. According to fundamental financial principles, as supply reduces while need stays constant or increases, the price of these terminated cases skyrockets.

With the shift from CS: GO to CS2, the visual fidelity of weapon surfaces altered considerably. Skins that looked mediocre in CS: GO frequently gained tremendous sheen, depth, and appeal in the Source 2 engine, triggering unforeseen spikes in the rates of both specific skins and the older cases that contain them.

Popular Weapon Cases Throughout History

Some cases hold legendary status within the community due to the renowned skins they presented. Here are a few noteworthy examples:

- **The Operation Bravo Case (2013):** One of the earliest operation cases, popular for real estate the Fire Serpent AK-47 and a traditional selection of original knife surfaces.
- **The Chroma Case Series:** Introduced the popular Doppler, Marble Fade, and Tiger Tooth knife finishes, sealing them as fan favorites.
- **The Prisma Case Series:** Known for offering lively, colorful community-designed skins at accessible cost points, along with gamma doppler knives.
- **The CS20 Case:** Released to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the Counter-Strike franchise, including community favorites like the Wildfire AWP.
