

If you're working to help an heavier horse lose weight, the right answer is usually not a particular brand of horse feed. It is a feeding plan built around calorie intake, forage quality, portion control, and the horse's body condition score. The proper horse feed can support weight management, but only if it fits the whole diet and you avoid frequent rich mistakes.
