

Hollyville is the kind of place people often pass through without realizing how much sits just beyond the roadside trees and familiar county roads. It does not announce itself with a skyline or a crowded downtown, and that is part of the appeal. The community has the quiet, lived-in feel that defines much of inland Sussex County, where the pace is steadier, the distances are short, and the best discoveries usually come from lingering a little longer than planned.

For visitors, Hollyville rewards a slower kind of attention.
