

Oshawa's weather overview

Oshawa sits in the Durham area on the north shore of Lake Ontario, which gives the city a unique set of weather patterns through the year. Its **humid continental climate** delivers four distinct seasons, with clear shifts in **temperature**, **precipitation**, and **humidity** from month to month. That mix makes a helpful **monthly forecast** especially useful for anyone planning commutes, outdoor activities, or home projects in the area.

As in much of southern Ontario, Oshawa experiences shifting weather systems from the west, north, and off the lake. **Storm systems** moving through the **Greater Toronto Area** can cause rain, snow, or strong winds depending on the season. Climate in Oshawa, ON by seasonal pattern

Oshawa's **weather patterns** show a familiar Canadian rhythm: a long, cold winter; a variable spring; a warm, sometimes muggy summer; and a crisp fall that often brings spectacular colour before winter returns. Weather in spring in Oshawa
