- **Live roulette:** Similar to traditional casino live roulette, however generally adjusted with 3 colors (e.g., Red, Black, and Green), where Green provides a huge payout due to lower odds.
- **Coinflip:** A classic 1v1 video game where 2 players wager comparable skin worths, and a digital coin flip determines the sole winner.
- **Prize:** Multiple players dump skins into a common pot. A virtual wheel spins, and the person who contributed the most has the highest statistical chance of winning the entire pool, though luck can prefer

low-tier factors.
