

Newton has a way of surprising people. On paper, it looks like a comfortable suburban city just west of Boston, known for good schools, handsome neighborhoods, and commuter rail access. Spend a full day there, though, and a richer picture emerges. The city is really a patchwork of villages, each with its own pace, its own architecture, and its own sense of place. Historic homes sit near busy commercial corners. Tree-lined streets open onto old mill sites, parks, and small civic greens.
