

Short answer: Hamilton or Kitchener?

What is the best time of year to visit Hamilton, ON?

The best time of year to visit Hamilton, ON is usually spring through fall, with **fall colours** being especially rewarding on the escarpment. Summer is great for outdoor adventure and waterfront time, while shoulder season can be ideal for fewer crowds and comfortable sightseeing. Winter can work too, but waterfall trails may be icy and require caution.

Can you do a day trip to both Hamilton and Kitchener from the GTA?
