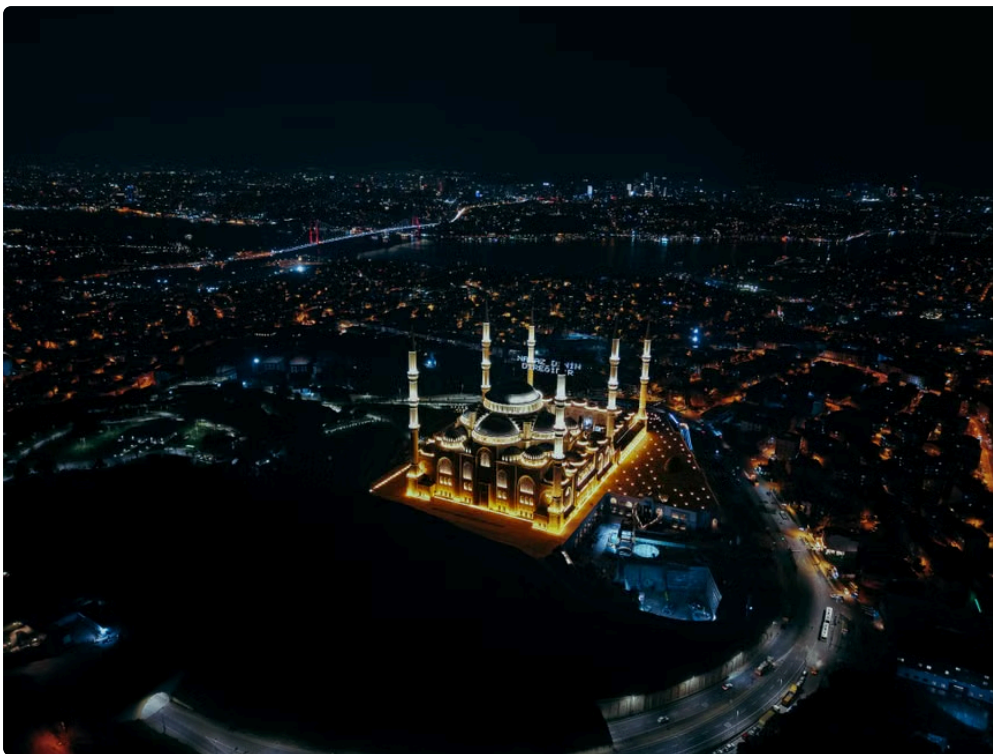
Tools and Metrics Related to Game Management
