Coinflip	A simple 1v1 game where 2 gamers wager equivalent skin worths. One is assigned heads, the other tails, and a digital coin determines the winner.	Low (Platform takes a little commission, around 3%-- 5%)

How CS2 Skin Deposits and Withdrawals Work
