- **Platform Volatility:** Unlike government-regulated gambling establishments, these websites operate in a legal gray location. They can go offline without warning, taking the users' deposited skins with them.

- **Constantly** verify the URL of the site to ensure it is not a phishing clone.
- **Use** Two-Factor Authentication (Steam Guard) on your Steam account.

- **Examine** the website's "Provably Fair" page to see how they verify their random number generation.

5. What occurs if I get scammed?

If you trade your skins to a malicious bot, those items are effectively gone. Valve does not offer support for trades made on third-party gambling sites, and they will not return items lost in such exchanges.
