Wear Conditions and Float Values

A skin's visual quality is identified by its **Float Value**, a numerical decimal ranging from **0.00** to **1.00**. The float worth dictates how scratched, used, or faded a weapon looks.

Counter-Strike divides float worths into five distinct exterior conditions:

1. **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Minimal to no visible wear)
2. **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight scratches, primarily tidy)
3. **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable wear and tear on high-friction areas)
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant scratches and paint loss)
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Extremely worn, rusted, or faded)

Note: Not every skin is offered in all 5 conditions. Some skins are capped at "Field-Tested," while others might just exist in "Factory New" and "Minimal Wear."

The Economics of Virtual Finishes

The monetary aspect of CS: GO skins is among the most remarkable functions in contemporary gaming. Supply and demand dictate rates. When a case stops dropping actively, the supply of its consisted of skins freezes while need might increase, driving up prices.
