operators, updating its Steam Subscriber Agreement to prohibit business usage of accounts and shutting down numerous automated trade bots.

Regardless of these efforts, operators often adjust by migrating to brand-new domains, utilizing decentralized payment methods, or decoupling their platforms from direct Steam API logins, making complete elimination challenging.
