Typical Door Issues and How to Fix Them

1. The Sticking Door

Humidity modifications frequently cause wood doors to swell, making them stick in their frames. Alternatively, loose hinge screws can cause the door to sag.

- **Action 1:** Inspect the hinges. Tighten up any loose screws. If the screw holes are removed, get rid of the screws, insert wood glue and toothpicks into the holes, let dry, and re-insert the screws.
- **Step 2:** If the door still sticks, find the binding point by moving a notepad along the gap.
- **Action 3:** Sand or plane the high spot down. Re-seal or paint the exposed wood to avoid wetness absorption.

2. Squeaky Hinges

A squeaking hinge is an easy fix that yields pleasure principle.

- **Step 1:** Open the door and place a wedge below it for stability.
- **Action 2:** Tap the hinge pin upward utilizing a hammer and a nail or punch tool.
- **Action 3:** Clean the pin with a wire brush or rag, use a lube (such as white lithium grease, petroleum jelly, or silicone spray-- prevent cooking oils that attract dust), and tap the pin back into place.

3. A Loose or Misaligned Latch

When a door fails to remain shut, the lock bolt is most likely missing out on the strike plate.

- **Step 1:** Apply lipstick to the lock bolt and close the door. The lipstick will leave a mark on the door frame, showing where the latch is hitting.
- **Action 2:** Adjust the strike plate by loosening it and submitting down the hole, or moving it somewhat up or down to line up with the mark.

Typical Window Issues and How to Fix Them

Windows are crucial for ventilation and natural light, but they are also main perpetrators for energy loss.

1. Drafty Windows

Drafts suggest degraded weatherstripping or failed caulking around the window frame.

- **Action 1:** Inspect the outside perimeter of the window. If the old caulk is broken or missing out on, scrape it away, clean the area, and apply a fresh bead of exterior-grade silicone caulk.
- **Step 2:** For double-hung windows, change worn-out V-strip or foam weatherstripping along the sashes to develop a tight seal when closed.

2. Stuck Single or Double-Hung Windows

Paint buildup or dirt tracks can glue a window shut.

- **Action 1:** Run an energy knife thoroughly around the perimeter of the sash to break any seals formed by dried paint.
- **Step 2:** Tap carefully along the frame with a rubber mallet to loosen the wood or vinyl.
- **Step 3:** Clean the tracks thoroughly and apply a silicone-based lubricant to assist the window glide efficiently.

3. Foggy Double-Pane Glass

If condensation appears *in between* the 2 panes of a double-pane (insulated glass) window, the seal has actually failed. Regrettably, this normally requires changing the glass unit (IGU) instead of the entire window frame.

3. How often should I inspect and replace weatherstripping?

Weatherstripping should be examined yearly, preferably before the start of winter season or summer. The majority of foam or rubber weatherstripping lasts between 3 to 5 years before it loses its flexibility and needs to be changed.

4. Why won't my moving glass door slide smoothly?

Debris, animal hair, and dirt typically collect in the bottom track, causing the door to jam. Vacuum the track completely, wash it with warm soapy water, and apply a silicone lube. If the door still struggles, the rollers below the door may need adjustment or replacement.
