3. **The Opening Phase:** Once all slots are filled and the lobby locks in, the virtual opening begins. The cases open in rounds, showing the items rolling for each individual.
4. **The Tally and Payout:** A live counter tracks the total market value of the skins pulled by each individual. At the end of the final case, the system tallies all games. The winner's stock is immediately credited with every single skin dropped in the fight (both their own and their opponents').

Popular Game Modes in Case Battles

- **1v1 Classic:** A direct head-to-head battle. Winner takes all.
