

Summer comfort in Southeastern Pennsylvania depends less on the thermostat than on what happens behind the grille, inside the refrigerant lines, and at the moment a struggling system is either diagnosed correctly or misread. ASHRAE Standard 62.2, which addresses residential ventilation, matters here because comfort is not just temperature; it is fresh air, moisture control, and balanced circulation. Once that is understood, the next question becomes more technical: what actually fails first in a Bucks County AC system?
