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A healthy septic tank is a quiet partner. When it works, you hardly consider it. When it fails, you think of little else. A backup on a vacation weekend, a soggy spot over the drain field, a whiff of sulfur near the tank lid, these issues bring real expenses and a fair quantity of tension. How a septic system really works
