

Hollyville sits in that part of Sussex County where Delaware still feels rooted in place. The roads are quieter than the beach corridors, the landscape opens up in a slower, more measured way, and the rhythm of daily life is shaped by farms, small neighborhoods, church gatherings, local businesses, and the long memory of a community that has grown without losing its footing.
