Gamers can trade ten weapon skins of the exact very same rarity tier for one weapon skin of the immediate next greater rarity tier, picked arbitrarily from among the collections represented in the traded products.

Best Practices for Trade-Ups:

- **Check Float Values:** The wear condition (float) of the resulting skin is computed mathematically based upon the average drifts of the 10 input skins.
- **Control the Pool:** Try to use inputs from the same collection to guarantee the output skin you desire, instead of blending collections and leaving your result to pure chance.
