- **Step 2:** Scrape away the old, fragile putty (glazing substance) using a chisel or putty knife, and take out the metal glazing points.
- **Action 3:** Measure the opening and cut a brand-new piece of glass roughly 1/8 inch smaller than the frame to enable for expansion.
- **Step 4:** Apply a thin layer of linseed oil or guide to the bare wood, followed by a thin bed of new glazing putty.
- **Step 5:** Press the glass firmly into the putty, protect it with brand-new glazing points, and use a smooth, angled bead of putty around the exterior edge. Paint once treated.
