The Dark Side of the Industry

1. Targeting Minors

- **Account Bans:** Valve regularly sweeps through and bans numerous bot accounts and high-profile user profiles associated with commercial gambling operations.

In spite of these efforts, the market has proven resistant. When one major site is closed down, two more seem to take its location, typically using cryptocurrencies as an intermediary action to bypass conventional banking blocks.
