Step-by-Step Guides for Common DIY Door Repairs

1. Fixing a Squeaky or Loose Hinge

A squeaky door is an easy repair, but a loose hinge requires a bit more attention.

1. **Find the issue:** Open and close the door slowly to determine the troublesome hinge.
2. **Tighten screws:** Use a screwdriver to tighten up any loose screws. If the screw holes have ended up being removed, get rid of the screws, place a little wood sliver (or a toothpick covered in wood glue) into the hole, and reinsert the screw for a tight grip.

2. Changing a Sticking Door

If a door rubs against the frame when closing, it is generally because the leading hinge is loose, causing the door to sag, or the wood has broadened.

1. **Inspect the hinges:** Tighten all screws on the leading and middle hinges.
2. **Utilize the longer screw trick:** If tightening does not work, replace one brief screw on the frame side of the leading hinge with a 3-inch wood screw. Drive it deep into the framing stud to pull the entire door assembly back into alignment.

3. **Airplane the edge:** If the door still sticks after changing the hinges, utilize a block airplane or a sander to shave down a tiny fraction of wood from the sticking edge, then repaint or seal the exposed wood.

Preventive Maintenance Tips

- **Check Weatherstripping:** Inspect exterior doors every year for fractures, tears, or compression. Replace used strips to maintain home energy performance.

- **Control Indoor Humidity:** Since wood expands and contracts with wetness, maintaining a steady indoor humidity level utilizing air conditioning or dehumidifiers assists prevent wooden doors from warping and sticking.

The majority of the time, a door that won't lock is just suffering from misalignment between the lock bolt and the strike plate. You can typically fix this by loosening up the screws on the strike plate and moving it somewhat up or down, or by submitting down the within lip of the strike plate opening.
