Beyond exterior wear, skins can also have a **StatTrak™** module (which tracks verified eliminates with that particular weapon, marked by a little digital counter) or be designated as **Souvenirs** (dropped during official Valve-sponsored esports tournaments, including gold team and occasion sticker labels).

### The Economics of the Steam Marketplace and Third-Party Sites

The CS2 economy works just like a real-world stock market. Costs are dictated totally by supply and demand, rarity, and community perception.

## Why Are Some Skins Worth Thousands of Dollars?

1. **Rarity:** Skins are classified by tiers (Consumer, Industrial, Mil-Spec, Restricted, Classified, Covert, and Special/Exceedingly Rare). The drop rates for high-tier items, especially knives and gloves, are infinitesimally small.
2. **Trade-Ups:** Players can trade in 10 skins of a particular tier for one random skin of the next greater tier, burning important items in the process and decreasing overall supply.
3. **Pro Player Influence:** When a well-known esports professional uses a particular skin during a significant competition, the cost of that skin frequently spikes over night.
4. **Drift Extremes:** Some collectors pay enormous premiums for products with very low float values (e.g., 0.000 x) or extremely high floats where the gun looks entirely rusted away (known as "Blackiimovs" on the AWP Asiimov).

## Popular Platforms for Trading and Buying

While gamers can buy and sell products directly on the main **Steam Community Market**, funds are locked within the Steam ecosystem and can not be cashed out to a savings account. As a result, a robust third-party environment has emerged.

- **Steam Community Market:** Safest for casual users; deals utilize Steam Wallet funds.
- **Third-Party Marketplaces:** Platforms like Skinport, DMarket, and Buff allow users to buy skins with fiat currency or cryptocurrencies, and typically feature cash-out options.
- **Peer-to-Peer (P2P) Trading Sites:** Sites where buyers and sellers trade straight without the bot holding the product for a mandatory trade-hold period.
