Unfortunately, not all moving companies play fair. Being able to spot warning signs can save your move from unnecessary stress and expense. Here are the biggest red flags to avoid:

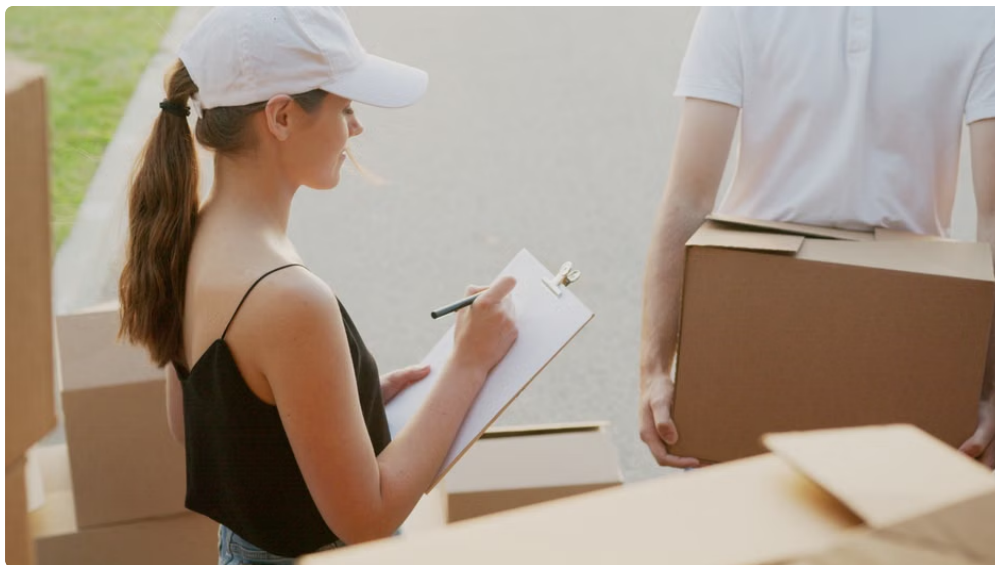
### 1. Movers Who *Won't Share Insurance*

One question I always ask, as a former crew lead, before booking is "**Is that in writing?**" But beyond contractual promises, reliable movers must be able to provide proof of insurance. Insurance isn't just paperwork—it's your protection in case belongings get damaged or lost. If a company is hesitant, vague, or refuses to show their insurance certificate, big red flag.

According to Thumbtack, you should verify whether the movers have:

- General liability insurance
- Cargo insurance covering your belongings
- Worker's compensation coverage

Without these in writing, you risk footing the bill yourself in case of accidents.



## 2. Hidden Fees Pattern

One of the most frustrating traps during local moves is hidden fees—charges that appear after the fact without prior warning. Those fees may pop up for:

- Extra time needed due to stairs, elevators, or long carries
- Additional packing materials or services
- Furniture disassembly and assembly
- Moving heavy or specialty items
- Toll or parking fees

Many movers advertise a low hourly rate but then rack up a surprising final bill by hiding these fees or not mentioning them upfront. I always keep my checklist top of mind to ensure stairs or bulky items are accounted for ahead of time.

Before hiring, ask for a detailed list of what fees you can expect and require that these appear in writing before moving day. Transparency is crucial to avoid unpleasant surprises.

## 3. Vague Estimates

Another common pitfall is vague or overly broad estimates. If a mover offers a “half-day” or “full-day” estimate without clarifying hours, number of movers, or inclusions, be cautious.

An estimate should clearly:

- Show hourly rate and number of movers
- Specify services included (packing, loading, assembly)
- Outline any extra charges and what triggers them
- Explain policies on delays, waiting times, or cancellations

The more precise and in writing, the better. If details are fuzzy or the mover keeps changing their numbers, it’s a major warning sign of potential bait-and-switch pricing.
