The Rarity System

Every skin inside a case belongs to a specific rarity tier. These tiers identify the likelihood of getting the item and its possible worth.

percentages above represent the "base" opportunity per opening. The actual "Blue Gems" (Gold tier) are incredibly uncommon, frequently estimated at less than 0.0001% for specific high-tier knives.

How the Opening Mechanic Works

When a player clicks "Unlock," the video game produces a random number. This number associates to a particular item within the case's pool.

Float Value & StatTrak

An essential aspect in figuring out a skin's value is its **Float Value**. This is a number in between 0 and 1 that represents the wear and tear of the weapon:

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00 - 0.07
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07 - 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15 - 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38 - 0.45

- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45 - 1.00

Additionally, some skins include a **StatTrak™** counter, tracking the variety [Browse around this site](#) of kills made with that weapon. StatTrak versions are usually more expensive than their basic equivalents.

One of the most Popular and Valuable Cases

Not all cases are created equivalent. Older cases, or those consisting of famous skins like the "Fade" or "Case Hardened" Blue Gems, command astronomical costs on the Steam Community Market.

Top 5 Most Expensive Cases

1. **The CS: GO Weapon Case # 1:** The initial case. Costs fluctuate heavily however are typically very high due to nostalgia.
2. **The eSports 2013 Case:** Contains the iconic Howl.
3. **The Revolver Case:** Contains the R8 Revolver|Fade.
4. **The Operation Wildfire Case:** Introduced the Fire Serpent collection.
5. **The Clutch Case:** Known for valuable Gamma Doppler knives.

- **Typical Cost to Open:** £ 3.00 (Key) + £ 0.50 (Case) = **£ 3.50**
- **Average Return:** Typically hovers around £ 0.80 to £ 1.50, suggesting your home (Valve) and the marketplace generally profit.

Many players will get "scrap" (Consumer or Mil-Spec skins) worth cents. However, the thrill of the "roll" and the possibility of landing a Covert or Gold item keeps the economy alive. For financial investment purposes, buying the case straight is frequently much safer than paying for the secret to open it.

1. Where can I purchase cases?

You can purchase cases directly from the "Get" area in the CS: GO primary menu, or you can purchase them from the Steam Community Market for a variable rate.

4. Do cases disappear if not opened?

No, cases in your inventory do not expire. You can keep them forever.

5. Why do some cases cost more than others?

Supply and demand. Older cases are no longer stopped by the video game, making them limited. If they include a desirable skin (like the R8 Fade), the price remains high due to rarity.
