Low-to-Moderate (50/50 chances minus platform rake) **Jackpot/ Pot** Multiple gamers deposit skins into a communal swimming pool. Each skin contributes to the gamer's "ticket" share. A random ticket is drawn, and the winner takes the whole pot. High (Depends on the percentage of the pot owned) **Case Opening** Mimics the main Valve case openings, often with greater or personalized chances and special prize swimming pools. High (Typically undesirable return to player ratios) **Esports Betting** Wagering skins or cash on professional CS: GO/CS2 matches (e.g., ESL Pro League, Majors) based on live chances. Skill/Knowledge-dependent (Moderate threat)
