Navigating Weapon Categories

Battle is a main pillar of *Rust*, and choosing the right weapon can imply the distinction between an effective raid and losing hours of farming. The Rust Items Wiki classifies weapons to assist gamers examine their options before going out.

1. Melee Weapons

Used mostly for early-game resource event and peaceful eliminates.

- **Rock:** The classic starting tool.

- **Custom-made SMG:** High rate of fire, lethal in close-quarters fight.
- **Semi-Automatic Rifle (SAR):** The workhorse of mid-game *Rust*, providing excellent precision at medium range.

3. Endgame Armaments (Tier 3)

Requiring a Level 3 Workbench and valuable components, these weapons control open-field battles and base defense.

- **Attack Rifle (AK):** The gold requirement of *Rust* PvP due to its high damage and flexibility.
- **Bolt Action Rifle:** Ideal for long-range hunting and roof-camping.
- **M249:** A disastrous light machine gun obtainable just from Bradley APC or Helicopter crates.

Understanding Protection and Armor

In *Rust*, clothes does more than just keep a player warm in the snow-- it dictates the number of bullets they can absorb before going down. The Rust Items Wiki breaks down armor data into particular defense types:



- **Projectile Protection:** Reduces damage from bullets, arrows, and other flying projectiles.
- **Melee Protection:** Mitigates damage from swords, spears, and tools.

Raiding Tools and Explosive Costs
