- **StatTrak™:** Items with this technology include an orange LED counter that tracks the number of validated eliminates made with that specific weapon.
- **Keepsake Packages:** These are dropped throughout main Valve-sponsored esports competitions (Majors) and function gold sticker labels representing the teams and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve arranges CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which dictate how frequently they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Customer Grade (White):** Common, standard drops.
