1. Stopped and Souvenir Legends

2. Pattern-Based Rarities (Gem and Fade Tiers)

Certain skins make use of a "Paint Seed" system (ranging from index 1 to 1000) that dynamically alters how the texture maps onto the weapon. This develops extreme variations in rarity:

- **Gem Knives (Ruby, Sapphire, Black Pearl):** Specific Doppler knife surfaces where the blade is totally covered in a single shade, complimentary of the basic various colored swirls.
- **Blue Gems (Case Hardened):** Case Hardened patterns can vary from mainly gold to nearly entirely solid blue. A Tier-1 "Blue Gem" Karambit or AK-47 can command six-figure amounts due to the fact that the odds of rolling that precise pattern index are astronomically low.

3. Low Float Extremes
