Beyond exterior wear, skins can also possess a **StatTrak**™ module (which tracks verified eliminates with that particular weapon, marked by a little digital counter) or be designated as **Souvenirs** (dropped during main Valve-sponsored esports competitions, featuring gold team and occasion sticker labels).
