

Should I Disclose to the Coordinator If the Gathering Is Unexpected Early On?

To put it plainly: absolutely, yes. The moment you start talking to a planner, you should let them know the celebration is hidden.

But, let's explain the significance of this and what issues might arise from keeping this information.

Your specialist is your co-conspirator in ensuring the secret stays hidden—but they can only achieve that if they're aware of all the factors.

The Rationale for Being Transparent

The Advantages of Being Upfront

When you inform your professional right away about the secret nature, several things happen.

For starters, they can factor secrecy into all aspects of the event. Every component is designed with the surprise in mind.

Second of all, they can bring their skill to identify and block potential compromises and to address the specialized issues of surprise events.

Also, they can add nondisclosure terms with professionals and arrange for shipments and setups so that the birthday person doesn't notice anything.

Fourthly, they can handle all attendee coordination with explicit guidance on maintaining the surprise and can also assist you create the reason for the guest of honor.



Potential Risks of Not Telling Your Planner

If you keep your professional in the dark, various problems can occur.

They might send you materials while the celebrant is there. They could contact you that the guest of honor notices.

They might plan a consultation when the honoree might come along or contact the honoree directly without understanding they're the one being surprised.

Simply put, not telling your planner about the surprise is a significant error you can make when arranging a hidden event.

How Much Should You Share with Your Planner

So now that you know you should tell your planner, you might be thinking: what information is essential.

The answer is: provide all the information that has any bearing on the secret.

That means who the celebrant is, their routine and when they're free, what they would enjoy and what they wouldn't, the guest list and who to include, and any potential issues that might expose the secret.
