

If you have spent any time around modern cannabis concentrates, you already know the vibe: people don't just ask what's "strong," they ask what fits their day. Are you trying to stay functional and keep dosing predictable? Do you want fast onsets without the lingering "cloud" you can sometimes get from heavier combustion? Or are you more focused on ritual, taste, and the familiar feel of grinding and packing flower?
