

Knoxville has a way of surprising people. On a map, it looks like a practical Tennessee city with a strong regional identity and a busy pace, but spend a little time here and the texture becomes clearer. The old brick along Gay Street, the riverfront views, the university energy, the hillside neighborhoods, the pockets of music and food culture, all of it gives the city a layered feel that rewards walking, driving slowly, and looking up.
